KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



JACOB MOORE

Jacob Moore is the former president of the Arizona State Board of Education and also serves as tribal relations coordinator for the Arizona State University Office of Public Affairs where he helps to coordinate the American Indian Newly Elected Official (AINEO) program. Mr. Moore is Tohono O'odham, Akimel O'odham, Lakota, and Dakota and is an enrolled member of the Tohono O'odham Nation in Arizona. He is the managing partner of the Generation Seven Strategic Partners, LLC, a government affairs consulting group. He previously served as special assistant on congressional and legislative affairs for the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community and also had a 14-year career in banking.



ARTURO VARGAS

Arturo Vargas, nationally recognized expert in Latino demographic trends, electoral participation, voting rights, the Census, and redistricting, is the current executive director of the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials (NALEO). He also serves as executive director of the NALEO Educational Fund and oversees its programmatic activities, which include U.S. citizenship outreach and assistance, civic participation and integration, voter engagement, technical assistance to elected and appointed Latino officials, research on Latino demographic and electoral trends, and policy analysis and advocacy on access to the democratic process.

Mr. Vargas' experience and expertise has resulted in many national awards, among them: *Hispanic Magazine's* Hispanic Achievement Award for Community Service, the National Federation of Hispanic Owned Newspapers' Leadership Award, and the National Association for Bilingual Education President's Award.



JOSEPH EDWARD "JOE" PRINCE

Joe Prince excels at overcoming obstacles. Despite a diagnosis of mild autism, he successfully completed his education at Ravenswood High School in East Palo Alto, California. Gifted with a special talent in track and field, he was discovered at age 15 by Tommie Smith, the iconic 1968 Olympic 200-meter champion. Mr. Prince continued his success in track and field at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and was the 1974 CCAA Conference 220-yard sprint champion earning NCAA College All American honors. As an elite-level track and field athlete and member of the U.S. National Team, Joe Prince was poised to challenge for a spot on the U.S. Olympic team when he was struck with cancer. He overcame this disease, recovered his health, and graduated from Fresno Pacific College, achieving his goal of becoming an educator. He documented his life experiences in his book *Liberation Saturday*. This book, which also chronicles his personal saga of perseverance, going the distance and overcoming multiple life challenges was turned into a short documentary film in 2008 also titled *Liberation Saturday*. Today, Mr. Prince continues to use his hard-earned wisdom to inspire and motivate young people as a special educator and head track and field coach at Sahuarita High School in Arizona.
